#### **OUR MISSION:**

#### **ANC LEADS ADTEC IN ACQUIRING** \$2.3 MILLION FEDERAL WORKFORCE GRANT

Arkansas Northeastern College is part of a federal grant designed to increase the labor force in the Arkansas Delta by preparing new entrants to the workforce, particularly those from impoverished backgrounds and the formerly incarcerated, as well as dislocated workers for jobs in high-demand fields.

ANC is a part of a group of colleges, in the Arkansas Delta region, recently awarded a \$2,324,336 grant designed to help put people to work. This summer, the Arkansas Delta Training & Education Consortium (ADTEC), led by the Arkansas Northeastern College (ANC), applied for a U. S. Department of Labor-Education & Training Administration (DOLETA) grant aimed at the Delta Regional Authority (DRA) and the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC), entitled Workforce Opportunity for Rural Communities (WORC). ADTEC consists of five community col-

leges serving 14 counties in eastern Arkansas, as well as three counties in Missouri and one county each in Tennessee and Mississippi. On September 30, DRA announced that ADTEC's project, Arkansas Delta Workforce Opportunities for Rural Communities (ADWORC), was one of 18 projects funded by the \$29 million Federal initiative. ADWORC was the only program in Arkansas funded by DOLETA. The project is funded 100% with federal dollars.


The colleges joining ANC in the ADWORC grant are East Arkansas Community College, Phillips Community College of the University of Arkansas, Arkansas State University-Newport, and Arkansas State University-Mid-South. ANC's share of the grant funds is \$704,064 over the next three years with all funds supporting the ADWORC initiative.

As part of ADWORC, there will be a subsidized wage incentive for Mississippi County employers who hire ADWORC graduates.

With ADWORC being specifically geared toward the hard-to-reach population, intensive case management resources will be implemented. Funds will be used to deliver workplace readiness training modeled after ANC's Workforce Orientation and Retraining Keys (W.O.R.K.) program, offer industry credentialing opportunities, and provide work-based learning experiences through on-the-job verification (OJV) coaching. OJV involves the case manager or other personnel functioning as a liaison between the client/new employee and the employer to ensure that skills acquired through training are being properly applied during either a paid internship or initial employment opportunity. Several of the ADWORC colleges will use grant resources to offer cash incentives to participants for NCRC attainment (\$50), ADWORC training completion (up to \$200), and employment attainment (\$250).

Along with these intensive services, ANC will employ a case manager to work directly in the community to assist prospects in utilizing the training and services available to find employment. To provide opportunities to those in the more




hard-to-reach populations, ANC offers free transportation, through its two Opportunity Buses, to the College for training, classes, and GED preparation. ANC provides mentoring from community volunteers to give each participant an encouraging advocate to help them along the way and keep them on track. ANC also provides "Fun Days" recruitment activities out in the community. From free hair-cuts and free food to chances to win prizes, these "Fun Days" events are held to bring the community together to learn about educational opportunities. The ANC Career Pathways Initiative (CPI), which has led the state for 13 of 14 years in educating participants who then find jobs, is available to eligible participants who have a dependant under the age of 18. The CPI programs operates under a case management approach and provides individualized academic and career advising, as well as direct student support to cover costs such as tuition and fees, books, childcare, and transportation.

ANC recognizes that food insecurity is a real issue for many and is working with partner agencies in providing food and shelter to individuals in need. This service is designed to enable individuals to focus on overcoming barriers to finding and maintaining employment. Additionally, ANC provides a Career Closet where students have access to appropriate job attire at no cost through donations from the local community.

"The awarding of this ADWORC grant will fund a crucial piece of the puzzle that ANC is putting together to combat the challenge of generational poverty by providing disadvantaged individuals and households a direct avenue to a better quality of life through training, education, and employment. We are collaborating with our college and community partners to expand this design throughout the Delta region to serve as a national model," said ANC President Dr. lames Shemwell. "If successful, our efforts will positively impact crime rates,

property values, and public school performance in Mississippi County and beyond," added Shemwell.

Having previously attended ANC, Miller has a strong knowledge of the resources and opportunities that ANC provides and looks forward to any chance to share her experiences with others.

Osceola Center Coordinator, Kaci Bell explains that the opportunity to make a difference even close to her hometown of Wilson is what led her to the Osceola campus. From young children taking a community education class or even the retiring employee who has decided that now is the time to learn a new skill through evening classes, the Osceola Center is growing to meet the needs of the community.

"No matter the need, we hope to make everyone feel welcomed at the Osceola Center. "We want people to feel comfortable asking questions, and we are here to assist them in breaking it down one step at a time in order to reach their goals," said Bell.

The Osceola Center campus is available to make ANC and education more accessible for more residents in Mississippi County. The Center provides a wonderful opportunity for those wanting to start or continue their college 2 classes on a smaller campus with a personable feel.

## PATHWAYS AT ANC CHOSEN TO PILOT PROGRAM Arkansas Career C

**PATHWAYS** 

Career Pathways at Arkansas Northeastern College has recently been selected to pilot the TANF CAREERConnect subsidized employment program. Participants must be receiving Transitional Employment Assistance (TEA) benefits.
The TEA program helps economically challenged families with children under the age of 18 to become more responsible for the support of their families. Representatives from the local and state Department of Workforce Services were on hand to discuss the program with representatives from Arkansas Northeastern College. The program allows the Department of Workforce Services to reimburse employers up to 100% of a participant's wages for the first month and up to 50% of the employee's second-sixth months' wages. Prior to employment, Career Pathways at ANC will provide any necessary training.



Hearing about the ANC college experience from the students' perspective and finding out what works well and what needs improvement is invaluable in furthering the mission of Arkansas Northeastern College.

## OPPORTUNITIES AVAILABLE IN EMS AT ANC

ANC has openings in their 12 month Technical Certificate in Paramedic and Certificate of Proficiency in EMT with classes beginning January 14, 2020. The Paramedic Program provides training and education to current EMTs in advanced pre-hospital patient care. The course includes classroom and online instruction along with clinical lab and field experiences in various healthcare and pre-hospital agencies in the region. Graduates of the Paramedic Program are prepared to function effectively as a professional provider of ad-

vanced life support in the pre-hospital environment such as ambulance services and fire departments. After successful completion of the program, graduates are eligible to apply to take the National Registry Exam to become a Paramedic.

The EMT course is a one semester Certificate of Proficiency course that provides training in recognizing, assessing, and managing medical emergencies of acutely ill or injured patients in a pre-hospital care setting. The course includes classroom instruction along with outside clinical experiences. The evening course is scheduled from 5pm-9pm on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Graduates of the EMT course are eligible to take the National Registry Exam to become an EMT.

There are wonderful opportunities in EMS with the opportunity to earn high wages. The most recent data collection for the state's Economic Security Report revealed significant, first-year earnings for ANC graduates. The 2018 report showed that ANC students completing the EMT Program earned \$56,643 per year while Paramedic graduates earned \$57,001 per year.

Both the ANC Paramedic program and EMT course are approved by the Arkansas Department of Health and Human Services, Section of Emergency Medical Services. The Paramedic Program is also accredited by the Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Education Programs (CAAHEP) and Committee on Accreditation of Educational Programs for the Emergency Medical Services Professions (CoAEMSP).
