

I can remember being nine years old and seeing MCCC flyers and stickers at Central Elementary School, plus all around town. My parents even had one on our refrigerator at our home on Meadow Lane. On December 17, 1974, the citizens of Mississippi County voted to tax themselves to create the Mississippi County Community College. Seemed like a good idea at the time, especially eight years later when I left Blytheville High School after the 11th grade to begin college at MCCC. I never dreamed then that I would return 12 years later to spend a career at our College. 

U.S. STEEL AND ENTERGY ARKANSAS PARTNER WITH ARKANSAS NORTHEASTERN COLLEGE TO OFFER STEEL TECH ACADEMY FOR HIGH SCHOOL SENIORS

U. S. Steel's Big River Steel facility and Entergy Arkansas, have entered into a partnership with Arkansas Northeastern College (ANC) to support The Steel Tech Academy, a hands-on internship program for high school students to prepare them for career opportunities in the steel industry. This partnership includes an investment of \$75,000 from Entergy Arkansas and \$225,000 from U. S. Steel. The investment demonstrates a robust commitment to the local communities and their future.

"This is exciting news for Arkansas high school students," said Dr. Jamie Frakes, Associate Vice President for Workforce Development and Allied Technologies, Arkansas Northeastern College. "With more people leaving the workforce than entering

the workforce, there is an urgent need and value in having a sustainable pipeline of prepared talent, interested and ready-to-enter careers in the local steel industry. I'd like to thank U. S. Steel and Entergy Arkansas for investing in this partnership."

"U. S. Steel is thrilled to help make The Steel Tech Academy a reality," said Daniel R. Brown, U. S. Steel's Senior Vice President - Advanced Technology Steelmaking and Chief Operating Officer for Big River Steel. "U. S. Steel is investing in our operations in Arkansas because the future of steelmaking is here. This program will train the next generation to keep steel mined, melted and made in America."

The Steel Tech Academy is envisioned as a two-year paid internship program, with the first year taking place during students' senior year in high school and the second year continuing after high school graduation. ANC will begin recruiting students for The Steel Tech Academy with an "Internship Week" to be held in the summer of 2023. U. S. Steel and other partners will be on-hand to make presentations, interview interested candidates for internships, and make internship offers to specific students.

Students participating in the Academy will be immersed in steelmaking processes, industrial technology, and manufacturing principles to prepare them for making immediate contributions. Some of the courses that will be considered for inclusion in the curriculum include: Basic Metallurgy, Basic Electricity, Basic Hydraulics and Pneumatics, Maintenance Welding, and Industrial Safety.

Internship opportunities will be project-based and will involve "bringing the company" to the classroom/lab, rather than students visiting production facilities. Beginning late in the first year and continuing into the second year, however, the internship will immerse students in steelmaking operations under the supervision of U. S. Steel employees. Internships will occur around class schedules in coordination with U. S. Steel.



Fisher Completes LeadAR Experience

Courtney Fisher, Director of Enrollment Services, recently completed LeadAR, an intensive 18-month hands-on program through the University of Arkansas: Division of Agriculture — Research & Extension. The program is designed to help Arkansans broaden one's understanding of issues and opportunities facing our state and strengthen his or her ability to make a difference.

Fisher and twenty others made up Class 19. While the program is almost 40 years old, and has hosted more than 500 members, only 7 participants have been selected from Mississippi County.

When asked about her experience, Fisher said, "LeadAR helped me learn and love so much more about Arkansas. Ideas were cultivated and connections were made statewide that really can help propel us in future endeavors. I feel very fortunate having been chosen for this honor to participate, and even more fortunate that I had the College's support. It truly was a one-of-a-kind experience for which I am very grateful."

Meetings were held monthly through zoom or in person in various counties in the state. Highlights from the experience include the National Study Tour, which took place in Washington D.C. in Fall 2021, and the International Study Tour which included 11 days in Portugal in September 2022.



ANC Tech Center and Allied Technologies Students Earn National Credentials

During the month of October, The Solutions Group, in partnership with Rural Development Partners, funded Core 4 Heavy Equipment training for approximately 30 ANC Tech Center high school students and 30 ANC Allied Technologies college students. After the successful completion of training, operators are able to calculate load balance, provide material handling services, and operate two types of forklifts and two types of articulating lifts. The Solutions Group was awarded a grant from Rural Development Partners to train instructors Ibrahim Alisic, Josh Chipman, and Mike Street as Heavy Equipment Core 4 trainers. The grant also funded the Rough Terrain Forklift and the national certifications these students obtained after successful completion.





The Solutions Group and Majestic Steel Hosted Job Fair at ANC

Majestic Steel and The Solutions Group collaborated to host a job fair at the ANC Center for Allied Technologies during September in preparation to hire employees for their new Blytheville location. The Solutions Group is responsible for the first round of training for the new workforce. The training will include Overhead Crane, Counterbalance Forklift, Electrical Safety, as well as Confined Space Permit training. Office of Skills Development and Great River Economic Development Foundation grants were written by our Dean for Customized Training, Stacey Walker, to aid in the cost associated with the training. After successful completion of the first round of training, approximately 6-10 individuals will have completion certificates for each topic. Special thanks to Majestic Steel, The Solutions Group instructors, local partners, GREDF, and OSD for this collaborative effort.

It is very hard to find the words to adequately describe what Dr. James Shemwell has meant to the Arkansas Northeastern College, to much more than that really, but especially to our ANC family. His announcement in October of his plans to retire June 30, 2023, left those of us fortunate enough to work at ANC with an array of emotions: sadness, uncertainty, and fear to name a few, but we are also happy and excited for our leader who has more than earned the time to enjoy the fruits of his labor.

Once we get past the sadness, we can think through the uncertainty to realize that he has prepared us, this wonderful institution, for future growth and success by the leadership he has provided the past 10 years. Dr. James Shemwell is a visionary who has spent his tenure as President of the Arkansas Northeastern College as an innovator instilling momentum and change while unapologetically fighting for what is best for our students and our College. He runs a tight ship and demands, for our students' sakes, our best efforts, but he also cloaks us with a feeling of protection, reassurance, and pride in our College and what we do. In Dr. Shemwell, we know that we have a voice, someone who will stand up for us and who will have us leaping mountains others would not attempt to climb. In doing so, he has instilled in us a strength and resilience that can only flourish whether under his tutelage or another's. So, as we ponder the retirement of Dr. lames Shemwell, we cannot help but to reflect on the many accomplishments our College has seen in the last 10 years.

Shemwell, who has been with ANC since 1994, began his career at ANC as Coordinator of the Osceola Center, in partnership with the Osceola/South Mississippi County Chamber of Commerce where he simultaneously served as its Excecutive Director. He moved up the ranks at ANC to Dean for Technical Programs & Training in 1999, then to Vice President for Finance in 2010, where he served until his appointment as President in January 2013. Through his leadership, ANC has garnered national recognition and become a frequent contributor to the American Association of Community College's dialogue for numerous topics. He has positioned the Arkansas Northeastern College as a nationwide leader, and to quote him ANC is, "the best College in the country."

Shemwell began his journey as president on a mission. He hit the ground running and has not slowed. He quickly implemented changes to improve college-wide communication, changes to improve student advisement and success, merging of programs to improve efficiency and more collaboration, and more long-term planning in developing a strategy for a world-class Center for Allied Technologies that came to fruition in 2018.

Under Shemwell's reign, ANC has overcome the achievement gap with minority students performing as well as or better than white students, has produced the highest earning graduates in the state for multiple years, and the Community Relations department was created to provide a multitude of services and assistance to the underserved community including free transportation, food, clothes, and mentoring. He partners with community groups and has formed the President's Council to create an active group working to infiltrate the underserved areas of the county to provide more than assistance, but to instill hope.

From his early days with the College to now, Shemwell has worked with industry in innovative ways and used more of a business approach than an academic one in meeting their needs. The Solutions Group, which Shemwell originally helped to create in 1996, has grown and evolved as a premier provider of customized training, recognized nationally for innovation, and home to the Arkansas Steelmaking Academy: a partnership forged by Shemwell with the SMS group's North American operations which serves as the only training hub of its kind for all of North America.

The College, through Shemwell's leadership, has gained the confidence of industry partners who are willing to support its efforts and help solidify its place as a leader in workforce development. Serving on numerous boards and commissions during his career with ANC, Shemwell is widely respected for his contributions and often looked to for advice and insight. He has been invited to speak at national conferences and included as one of only 15 community college leaders featured in a book about workforce development that included experts worldwide. He does whatever he can to promote ANC so that the College is positioned to better serve its constituency.

It is overwhelming to really think about his career with ANC and the many accomplishments that have occurred through his vision and guidance. Unfortunately *Connections Magazine* is not a large enough publication to capture in one issue the many positive things that Dr. James Shemwell and the Arkansas Northeastern College have done during his time as president. We try to give a glimpse through our issues published twice each year, but even that does not totally encapsulate it. So, to put it simply, after almost 30 years of service to ANC, Dr. James Shemwell has left an undeniably amazing mark, and he will leave his institution even better than he found it. For this and so many other reasons, we thank you Dr. Shemwell.
